Besides teaching students of practical subjects like Botany , Zoology, Physics, Chemistry, Geography, Psychology, Home Science do their practical in the well equipped laboratory with assigned teachers. 10. It may be either local or outside, the district or state with the written permission of guardians and responsibility bond by the tour incharge. 11. Laboratory is maintained by lab-boy and lab assistant. Required equipments, materials apparatus, stationary item are fulfilled by college authority. 12. Routine is also sent to the departments for their convenience. 13. Teaching plan of the chapter to be taught is prepared by the techer which is approved by the HOD seeing the syllabus and course. 14. Beside teaching students are encourage for Co and extra curricular activities for which instruments , sports kits etc is provided by sports department.
